The Spiritual Life Ministry Team will be hosting Love Feast on Thursday evening, April 1 at 7 pm. Love Feast is a special time of worship for our church family. We will keep the same modifications to our service that were in place in fall 2020. Below is a description of these changes so you can be aware of them before arriving to participate.

Seating: We will use our round tables with six chairs at each table. The tables will be spaced throughout the Main Gathering area. You are encouraged to sit with family and others that you would be comfortable eating with as if you were in a restaurant.

**Feet Washing**: Feet washing stations will be socially distanced. As always, we will offer hand washing. A regular part of the feet washing is a hug at the end. We encourage you to ask your partner if a hug would be welcomed before hugging.

**Meal**: The soup and beef will be served in individual plastic bowls and we will use plastic table service. Grapes and a slice of bread will be served on individual plates, wrapped in Saran wrap. We will provide bottled water or you can bring your own.

**Communion**: Communion will be placed on separate tables similar to what we've been doing on Sunday mornings.

You are requested to wear masks consistent with our current practice for Sunday morning worship. People are not expected to wear masks during the mealtime.

Pastor Eric mentioned in a recent sermon that he wanted to provide more opportunities for us to share our financial resources in a sacrificial way. The Mission Ministry Team would like to suggest a way that we can help several mission efforts, both locally and around the world.

Many of our church family will be receiving stimulus checks from the government. These funds have been very helpful to those who have been financially devastated by the COVID-19 pandemic; likely including some in our congregation. We know that some of you have already made decisions about how to use the stimulus money you will receive, either for your own needs or to meet the needs of others. We are providing this additional opportunity to give all or a portion of the money you will receive to meet important needs "outside the walls" of our congregation. We are establishing a goal of \$100,000 for this short term Mission Stimulus Fund.

We have identified a few possible projects for these funds. We can assist the Delmas congregation in Haiti which has not been able to meet together in a church building since a devastating earthquake in 2010. We can help congregations in Rwanda make necessary government mandated COVID related alternations to their church buildings so they can meet again. We can help purchase a school bus to transport children to their school in Nigeria so they do not have to walk long distances to school, risking abduction by Boko Haram or other terrorist groups. We also will look to identify mission projects in our local area such as InterVarsity's ministry on the campuses of Bucknell and Susquehanna. We will identify projects both here and abroad that can utilize the resources we give to make a real difference. All of the projects we would support in other countries will be through the Church of the Brethren. These projects have been properly vetted and there is financial accountability in place.

When we receive the money, we will identify the projects we can support, get Ministries Coordinating Team approval of each project and then present the projects for congregational approval at our May Church Council Meeting. We are excited to share what the Lord can do with these resources and to get your valuable input on how the money is allocated. We will also be able to share updates from those who are being helped as they put our offering to good use.

Can we as a congregation, out of our abundance, help our brothers and sisters in our area and around the world? This is a time when our church can focus on God's greater mission outside our walls. If you choose to donate toward this effort please designate your contribution to the "Mission Stimulus Fund". We will start receiving money into this fund on March 21<sup>st</sup> and expect that the effort will conclude on April 11<sup>th</sup>. Of course, if you do not receive your stimulus check until after April 11<sup>th</sup> but would still like to participate, you can do so, up to the end of April. # From Your Lead Pastor,



### What Was Lazarus Thinking?

Today I was reading chapters 11-12 in the gospel of John and I was struck by the words of John in chapter 12, verses 1-2: *"Then, six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus was who had been dead, whom He had raised from the dead.*<sup>2</sup> *There they made Him a supper; and Martha served, but Lazarus was one of those who sat at the table with Him."* 

This is the Lazarus that Jesus raised from the dead which is recorded in chapter 11. John writes so matter-of-factly that "Lazarus was one of those who sat at the table with Him". I wonder what Lazarus was thinking? What does a person think who was dead and is now alive...eating food and spending time with family and friends when he was dead just a few days ago?

When Lazarus was raised, John tells us that this produced two reactions. Some people worshiped Jesus. Others determined to kill Jesus. John also tells us that people had decided to kill Jesus. We don't have any further reference to Lazarus in the Bible. There are some conflicting accounts of what happened to Lazarus after the timeline of the New Testament. We don't really know what happened.

I began to ask myself, "What would I have thought if I was Lazarus?" To some he was a celebrity. To others he was an enemy. We don't know what happened. Did Lazarus become an avid follower of Jesus, going from village to village telling others about Jesus after the resurrection of Jesus? Did Lazarus fade into the background? I think we've all known people who have responded in different ways to the activity of Jesus. I've known some who have had God step into their lives in a special way and those people have gone on to do important things. I've also known others who have had little response to God's incredible activity.

I hope that each of us is excited to follow Jesus. I know that none of us have been brought from physical death to life but many reading this have been brought from spiritual death to life. Should that not move us to great activity and fervor? I think it should. Though we don't know what Lazarus did, I exhort each of us to live our physical lives in a passionate way of following Jesus as He has changed our spiritual lives. There is a saying that says, "Dead men tell no tales"....but "Spiritually alive men and women have a lot of tales to tell". Let's tell those tales!

### Caught in the "Cross" Fire & then the Supremacy of Jesus

Starting March 21<sup>st</sup> we will have a three week Easter series titled, "Caught in the "Cross" Fire". The cross of Jesus Christ caused a lot of strife and struggle. Of course, the cross was the instrument of death for Jesus Christ. We look upon the cross today as an instrument of life but in the time of Jesus the cross was only an instrument of death. No one had a cross hanging on their wall or a pendant around his/her neck.

The reality of the cross had some ramifications for those close to Jesus. What we will do is take a look at three different men who had to react to the reality of the cross of Jesus Christ. On March 21<sup>st</sup> we will take a look at Peter, specifically his denial of Jesus. On March 28<sup>th</sup> we will focus on Pilate and his interaction with Jesus during the trial of Jesus. Then on Easter Sunday, April 4<sup>th</sup>, we will take a look at doubting Thomas and his reaction to the cross of Jesus and the resurrection of Jesus.

Then on April 11<sup>th</sup>, we will begin a series on the book of Hebrews. We will take about 12 weeks to look at how Hebrews exalts the person of Jesus Christ but I'll talk more about that next month.

### Remember a New Purchase Process

The pandemic has affected the Buffalo Valley Church of the Brethren (BVCOB) in many ways including our **gift card program**. In 2020 we sold about \$70,000 less in gift cards which resulted in more than \$4,000 less in proceeds for our building debt reduction. As a result, we are making some changes to make it easier for you to order and use the gift cards.

The **monthly online order** which gives you access to 100's of businesses will start again the first Tuesday of every month. Gift cards ordered online by Tuesday of that week will be available on Sunday as has been past practice. February orders are due by noon on Tuesday February 2<sup>nd</sup>.

In addition, each week there will be an email containing a link to a **new simple online order form** that allows members to select from our usual stocked gift cards (Wengers, Weis, Walmart, Sheetz, CVS) that can be picked up on Sunday or arrangements made for local delivery. This process means that your cards will be ready for payment when you arrive on Sunday morning. Cards not picked up on Sunday will be held for following week or delivered if prearranged.

On weeks when online scrip card orders are processed through Shop with Script, the online orders will be combined with stock orders for easy distribution.

If you have not signed up, you simply set up a **family account** using the link above and then under "Manage nonprofits:" use **Enrollment Code:** 6916BB3729429 to add BVCOB so the church gets its contribution. Feel free to share this information with friends and family.

If you don't want to set up an account but want to order, let me know what you want, and I will place the order for you.
