November 6th Church Council Meeting

This year's Buffalo Valley Church of the Brethren (BVCOB) Fall Church Council meeting includes some important church items in addition to the usual reports.

The proposed church budget is actually reduced in total dollars, but includes some significant shifting of dollars and attempts to make our budget more realistic. Ministry teams were challenged to focus on the total \$\$\$ needs of the team and to not budget the max they might need in each line item as most teams never spend all the \$\$\$ budgeted.

In addition there have been significant changes in the salary scales approved by the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference that have forced some significant restructuring of our pastoral salaries. Financially we were unable to totally adopt all the changes including the 8% cost of living adjustment. However the Ministries Coordinating Team (MCT) working with the pastors have a plan put together and all the details will be explained at the meeting.

MCT has also committed to look at budget versus expenses prior to our spring congregational meeting and will propose budget revisions, if appropriate.

Other items on the agenda include a proposal to allow Pastor Reamer to work some weeks remotely from Florida and the establishment of the Malaysian Mission fund. The Malaysian Mission fund recognizes BVCOB as the sending church and will hold and control all tax deductible donations from church members or others. The fund will submit \$1200 a month, if available, to the designated Missionary which will be Ashley Wetzel while she serves.

Join us for a potluck lunch after the second service and the meeting will start at 1 pm.

November 1 Is Almost Here!

It is now time to turn in your calendar dates for the 2022 Church Calendar. The potential we have for bringing glory to God is unlimited and eternal!! Think about that and all the ways that we can bring glory to our wonderful, powerful and mighty God and Father!

Teaching our Children (& Ourselves)

For those of you who don't know me well, teaching Godly financial principals to my children is a high priority. I want them to understand financial stewardship, the importance of being intentional and having a plan.

We decided to give our children a weekly allowance – if they clean up after themselves, help with chores and overall display good behavior for the week. They can earn \$2.50 week. I looked up some ideas online and found an easy project using mason jars that we had laying around. We used my label maker to put the following descriptions on each of the 3 jars:

Tithe 10%, Save 30% and Spend 60%

They may have glazed over my lecture about how technically it's all God's money and that we are merely stewards of His money. How we always put the first 10% in the tithe jar and then put the remaining amounts in the other two. We talked about the allowance and how they earn it and then we practiced doing the math to put the correct amount in each jar – which they absolutely loved doing. Not only do they split their allowance, but any other money they get such as birthday money, tooth fairy or money earned for extra chores.

This small project has led to meaningful conversations about what's important to them; immediate gratification, saving for a larger purchase and how quickly small things can add up.

For example; at the intermediate school you can buy ice cream at lunch for \$1. I let Sophia know if she wanted ice cream she would need to reach into her own allowance for it. She ran to her spend jar every morning and proudly put her \$1 bill in her lanyard to get ice cream that day. After the first week, I decided to have a heart to heart with her to help her understand her choice to spend daily from her jar. When I quantified it for her helping her to understand her allowance of \$2.50 per week would not support her daily ice cream habit and how quickly the "extra spend" that she had would dwindle with this daily behavior; she decided on her own that maybe once a week or even less would be a better choice, and she concluded on her own that it would be more special to her that way too. Proud moment.

We all come from different backgrounds and of different means, but I want to encourage you to talk to your children about money. Find opportunities and encourage them to commit to your family's budget or even contribute where they can by "giving something up" or by contributing with their time – helping around the house.

I pray God will richly bless the time you invest in your children.

Renewed Community

"These remained faithful to the teachings of the apostles, to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to the prayers... And all who shared the faith owned everything in common; they sold their goods and possessions and distributed the proceeds among themselves according to what each one needed." (Hebrews 4:12, NET)

Formation in the Way of Christ:

For many, Christianity has been a source of legalism, judgment, and hurt. It can easily lead to a suspicion of discipline and religion. Reacting against the institution's sickness, we easily find ourselves with few rituals or practices to help us

heal from our own wounds, create new ways of life, and carve out a space where goodness triumphs.

Imagine athletes who suffered under an abusive coach: it will be very difficult to hear anyone urging discipline - suggested diet, exercise, etc.; but without some form of regular exercise, they will not be able to play as a team, perform to their ability or enjoy the sport to its full potential. There must be another way that is good.

After being forced apart in the pandemic, 'community' is making a comeback. "The longing for community is in all of us. We long to love and to But if community doesn't exist for something beyond us, it will atrophy, suffocate, and die." God's dream for humanity was love and harmony (if we look at the "Garden experience" in Genesis and Revelation). Humanity turned inward toward fear and protecting our self-interests. God, through Israel, prophets, Christ, and even the Church, longs to form a new humanity with distinct practices that offer hope and good news to the There are models of people and world. communities, like St. Francis of Assisi, that can be a model for us not only of what it looks like to follow hard after Jesus but also how we can celebrate the disciplines that have been passed down to us and become the church that we long for.

"Like any culture, we who follow the way of Jesus should have distinct ways of eating and partying, different from the culture of consumption, homogeneity, and hedonism. Our homes, our living rooms, even our parties can become places of solace and hospitality for those with addictions and struggles. But it doesn't happen without intentionality. Dorothy Day said, 'We have to create an environment where it is easier to be good."

Our communities should be places where people can detox, whether that be from alcohol, tobacco, gluttony, shopping, or gossip, maybe even self-centeredness and anger. We long for a space that tips us toward goodness rather than away from it, where we can pick up new habits - holy habits - as we are formed into a new creation, transformed by God.

Could This Be Your "Season"?

I like prayer walks. I find it easier to pray while walking than in any other position. I've never fallen asleep while walking and for some reason the movement of my feet seems to keep my mind from wandering as much. One thing I've found helpful in extending my prayer time is to pray Scripture back to God. Right now I'm using Psalms in the morning and Colossians in the evening. I had something happen two weeks ago that I thought might be an encouragement to many of you.

Psalm 1 contrasts the ungodly and the faithful through the metaphor of chaff and a firmly planted tree. I was drawn to the words, "that brings forth its fruit in due season" from verse 3, in reference to the tree.

I think that we all go through seasons of life. Adolescence is a season, being a student is a season, marriage, parenting small children, parenting older children, taking care of parents are all seasons. They can overlap but they also come and go in varying intensity. We all are familiar with the metaphor of bearing fruit as it relates to discipleship. Jesus taught in John 15 that a good tree bears good fruit.

As I was thinking about that phrase, I believe God revealed to me that I still had a season of "fruit bearing" in my life. I'm not exactly sure what this means...but I got a little excited about this. I've had seasons in my life where I felt like more spiritual fruit was produced than at other times and I am excited to see what God has in store.

Perhaps someone reading this has been a little frustrated with your fruit bearing results in this season of life. If so, perhaps you can be encouraged that other seasons await. Be patient and be faithful. God isn't finished with you yet.
