I hope you will take advantage of this and join in helping all of us to interpret and apply this important letter to our lives individually and to our church community as we begin the new year. \$3,194.55 for 10 TONS of JUNK!

That's right! Last year we recycled over 10 tons of aluminum cans and other metals through our Operation Christmas Child Mailing fundraiser. That would be 10 tons of junk that wasn't taken to the landfill and gave us over \$3,000 to help with mailing our OCC Shoeboxes. THANK YOU!

Please continue to bring your aluminum cans and place them in the Blue barrels by the bar-b-que pit. All other metal can be placed on the "Metal Recycling" trailer in the south side of the parking lot next to the Yoder Sheds.

I go through all of the metals that are placed on the trailer and separate the different types for recycling. Anything that has any type of metal in it or part of it can be placed in the trailer. We also recycle batteries. These would be 6 Volt or larger (no small flashlight type) up to the large car type batteries.

I have listed below the number of pounds and income from the different types of metal.

PIT

(Youth and families striving to be more Passionate about, Intimate with, Transformed by Christ & Community)



"If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but I do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal..." -1 Cor. 13:1

This is the passage youth are memorizing right now. It is considered one of the more beautiful passages of the Bible and as words run through our minds, the Holy Spirit can use them to reach and change our hearts!

This is one reason I am working on the Church participating in our very own Lent Reflection collection! There are so many different ways to interact with Scripture and ways that scripture can change us, because it can be God speaking to us! Such a task can be daunting, but here is a way that people have interacted with Scripture for centuries that has had meaningful results:

Lectio Divina (Latin for Holy Reading):

It is less of a "studious" way of reading the Bible, and more of a reflective, simple way - trusting that the Holy Spirit is guiding us to hear God's voice.

Prepare:

Set aside 15-60 minutes of uninterrupted time when you are fairly alert

Prav:

Formally invite the Holy Spirit to join you in reading, and guiding you

Read:

Read the 2-4 passages for the day. attention to what sticks out to you. Trust the Holy Spirit to direct your thoughts

Re-read the passage that "grabs you."

Reflect:

Read the selected passage

visualize what is being said/narrated

What smells, sounds come with the passage?

What feelings does it bring up?

Read for each character (if there are)/points of view – how does this passage look for them?

What verbs are used? What action is called

What word/phrase stands out to you? (that you like / or troubles you?

Spend time with that word - what does it mean/say to you

Response:

Simply and honestly respond to God

what do you want to say to God in return/question?

What are you bringing to reading this passage: stress, peace, joy, frustration - be honest, nobody but God is reading this...

Contemplation:

Enjoy the time you have spent with God

Thank God for listening, for being with you, for speaking to you...

What is God affirming in you? Asking you to do/work on?

Write out a sentence, paragraph, poem, song, etc. from your time with God.

This is a way to spend time and hear from God on a personal level. Another step is to share it with others - we can then see and experience God through each other.

Articulate/Share: (Options:)

Share your experience

What stood out to you?

What actions do you see called for?

What questions come to mind? (Note: the goal is not to provide answers, but inspire thoughts and reflection)

Share a song that encapsulates the experience

Here are some ideas for how to share for the Lent Reflections:

Options:

Reflect on how the 2-4 passages tie together Pick one passage and share some questions and thoughts that it inspires in relation to Christ's life, death, and resurrection

Focus on 1 word/phrase/image that sticks out; Share a song/art that comes to mind from the passage, how that encourages or challenges you (give credit to authors)

Share an original poem or story that the passage inspires

(Anything that reflects on something in the passage, submitted to the Holy Spirit, and is meant to help others reflect will be a blessing...)

I find great excitement in talking with anybody about this process. If you want examples - I can send some to you, or check out the BVCOB Facebook weekday posts. I would also love to work with anybody on this. I hope the above process helps, but don't feel constrained by it; there are other ways to reflect on scripture. This is the fun of doing this together - I look forward to hearing and sharing what God is saying to us!

Is There Really Strength in Weakness?

A passage of the Bible that has come to have a richer meaning for me in the past year is 2 Corinthians 12:9. In this part of Paul's letter, he is describing a "thorn in the flesh" that he has asked God to remove. We don't know what the thorn is, but it appears that it was something or someone that caused Paul great distress. Paul says that he prayed repeatedly for God to remove this "thorn" but God did not. In verses 8 and 9 we read this: "Concerning this thing I pleaded with the Lord three times that it might depart from me. And He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness."

I exhort you to believe these words. I am concerned that many do not. What often happens is that when tragedy or trouble enters into someone's life, he/she seems quick to pull back from ministry or service. People may indicate that because their life is in a difficult place, they can no longer serve...they don't have the time or emotional energy to contribute any longer. I acknowledge that this may be the truth for some, but I think this passage can be helpful in considering an alternative. Is it not possible, perhaps even likely, that the difficulty we are going through actually makes us more effective in serving Jesus Christ because we must rely more on God's power and strength instead of our own? Perhaps our "thorn" is a real benefit to our service for Jesus, but we'll never know it if we pull back or pull away?

Did Paul stop his missionary journeys because of the thorn? No. Here is how Paul responded, recorded for us in verses 9 - 10: Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me. 10 Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in needs, in persecutions, in distresses, for Christ's sake. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

We must realize that God's strength is made perfect in our weakness. We are likely to be the best version of a leader we can be when we are weak. We are likely to have the best insights into solving problems when we are in the midst of our own problems.

Is it time to pull back? Maybe. But it also might be time to push forward allowing God's grace to be sufficient and allowing His strength to be made complete in our weakness. As Paul said, when we are weak, we are strong.

Camp Eder History (Part 3)

What do you know about our church camp?

start this section from information found in Our Home In the Hills -A History of Camp Eder's First Fifty Years. "Against the backdrop of Nature, campers were offered a curriculum filled with wonder and inquiry. The principle beliefs of the Church of the Brethren were presented under such themes as peace, the need for community, the importance of each individual and the resolutions of conflicts. The real curriculum became something more than whittling wood, tying notes in ropes, using tools or weaving baskets from natural products. Brotherhood published printed materials...to assist the developing camping programs of the churches."

For those of you who attended in the past 20 years, you probably recognize several of those themes.

The first summer's scheduled camping experience was small in numbers but was considered successful (1960). "The Camping Committees secured the services of Ed Crill, a former Director of Camping and Youth programs for the Brotherhood (1952-1959). He conducted a camp of eight youth from August 14 - 20. The youth cleared the land at the site that became known as Vesper Hill." Many of you might still recognize that area!

Many nature lessons were discovered while camping....tadpoles, salamanders, slugs, mollusks, snails, spiders, squirrels, birds and more! Virginia Fisher, instructed the camp counselors, reporting, "The essence of worship is wonder....thus we come into the presence of God in His Majesty and the grandeur of His creation."

Next month, we will look at how the Southern District camp committees tackled the tasks of construction plans. Do any of you remember what was built first?
