"Camp Eder exists to be used by God to transform the lives of people for God's purpose and God's glory."

Camp began changing my life at age 11, when I first crested "Peter's Mountain" between Dauphin and Halifax, on my way to Camp Hebron's "Father-Son Canoe trip." The Susquehanna River Valley, in full view at that point, would affect the rest of my life geographically, relationally, and spiritually.

That canoe trip was by many criteria a disaster: as novice canoers, my father and I were frustrated by rocks and currents that we didn't understand, ending in our aluminum canoe being wrapped around a rock in a powerful rapid. But we also experienced God through the beauty of nature, the kindness and patience of others, and had open and honest conversation about our relationship.

I returned as a camper for 3 summers, and learned that the church was much broader, deeper, and more diverse than my small community. I began to experience God on my own, instead of just depending on my parent's and community's

faith. The counselors were a fun bunch of young people who seemed to really see me as a person, and pushed me to grow; I was determined to work at camp someday.

I returned as a lifequard in the summer of 1998 to Camp Hebron, and found friendships that would last for the rest of my life. If you are looking for a concentration of people passionate experiencing God in nature and relationships, summer camp is an excellent place to start. As a farmer, I knew what hard work was, but at camp I learned how to push into service of others, and discovered not only the "good weariness," but fulfilling love that helped make up for the hundreds of dollars we gave up in regular summer employment. I was often pushed to my limits and found the chinks in my character where Jesus could alternatively shine through and repair.

Camp, like most ministries, is not all sunshine and roses; there are thorns and miserable rainy days: people that seem to be there for selfish purposes, or are iust well-meaning inconsiderate. Our family continues to work at healing from some things we experienced. But this last week I had the opportunity to hike 20 miles of the Appalachian Trail with 2 friends that I found in my early days of camp. The connection that camp forged enabled us to share deeply and authentically about our struggles, hopes and dreams, and encourage one another in our continued life. Yesterday our family ran a 5k at Camp Hebron, where Sarah and I met almost exactly 24 years ago. We could laugh and cringe and remember specific events that shaped our relationship - the mountain path we sprinted each morning getting ready for soccer season, the pool chairs (now different) we used to scrub, the path Sarah first hit me in the head with a rock, etc.

If I could wish anything for our children and youth, it would be the type of relationships I found at camp - authentic, long-lasting friendships, deep communion with God, and ability to find God in both the quiet aloneness of nature, and the noisy busyness of people. So, I am excited to be returning to Camp Eder this summer as Camp Pastor. My boys are joining me, as are a few friends. Pastor Donita is putting out an invitation for others to join us that week. I extend that invitation - if not our week at Camp Eder, another week, or another camp.

Civility Lost...or at Least in Danger

An easy definition of civility is: "Formal politeness and courtesy in behavior and speech". Two recent examples have shown me that we are losing this. First, when the leaked draft opinion from the Supreme Court on the Dobbs case was revealed, about 100 protesters marched on the private homes of Justices Kavanaugh and Coney-Barrett. The Barrett's have seven children and I would estimate that at least four of them still live at home. Can you imagine how frightening it must have been for those children to hear the crowd shouting about their mother? I'm sure there are other examples of similar behavior from the other side of the ideological aisle as well.

Yesterday I read how the family of a prominent basketball player from the Phoenix Suns was heckled and even physically touched while they were in Dallas watching their husband and father play. One fan, who looked to be about 16, was escorted out of the arena. I don't know what was said but I think we can assume that the family was not being reminded of how awesome their loved one was on the basketball court.

These incidents are just the latest examples of how civility is breaking down in our world. Social media plays a part but what social media does is enflame the base passions of the human heart. To some extent this is nothing new, but it seems like the civility is decreasing. I hope that I am wrong. Why write about this?

I think that the followers of Jesus have a great opportunity to be different in this world. We will have very strong convictions about certain things like abortion (hopefully not basketball) or other important topics and I think there is a place for those opinions to be expressed in the public However, there is never a reason to square. protest or proclaim to a point where others' basic privacy or safety are compromised. We don't have to do that. If civility breaks down in the rest of civilization, it is up to the followers of Jesus to hold it up. I hope that you will consider how your actions and words represent Jesus. The world needs truth and the world needs to be confronted; but never in a way that compromises safety. Don't give people whose opinions or values you oppose, a reason to feel like they are your opposition. They are not the opposition.

Continuing Camp Eder History (part 7)

David Lehigh, James Poling, Joel and Nancy Knepper, George Detweiler and Senior Citizens' Days, do any of these sound familiar to you?

David Lehigh was a storyteller, bringing his expertise concerning nature and combining it with knowledge of the Bible. In 1970, he was employed by the camp to speak to the campers regarding plants, animals, and the created world, reminding campers "The Lord took man and put him in the garden to till it and care for it." Genesis 2:15. David led campers on walks through the woodland, pointing out creatures such as "walking sticks", ants and flies.

James Poling became the part time camp manager in 1969, serving part-time (60% time as pastor with West York congregation, and 40 % to lead the district's camping program). Under his leadership, camp representatives attended camp management workshops and learned more about camps for physically and mentally handicapped children. An intentional emphasis on peace became a part of the campers' discussions.

In 1972, Joel and Nancy Knepper became the new camp co-managers. (At that time, James Poling had begun full-time pastoral ministry at West York.) The Kneppers noted new ventures in camping ministry, with the United Church of Christ renting the camp for its camp sessions one year and then sending their campers to Camp Eder's regular sessions the following year. Outdoor Environmental Camps and Camps for those with Special Needs were added. Local schools sent their fifth graders to be part of the Outdoor program.

Senior Citizen Days started at camp in 1973 with forty-nine senior citizens who came to enjoy fellowship together with a highlight of singing old-fashioned hymns led by George Detweiler. These days continued with many enjoying the outdoors and seeing old friends and meeting new ones from the district churches.

Next month, we will look at the continued emphasis on outdoor ministry, the building of Schwarzenau and the naming of the campsite sections of Camp Eder.
